



What is Occupational Therapy?

Occupational Therapy (OT) is a health profession that uses purposeful activities appropriate to each person's age and social role to restore, develop, and maintain the ability for independent, satisfying living. Occupational therapists, as members of a health team, provide special services, individually or in groups.

Articulation Agreement in Occupational Therapy

Stern College for Women offers an articulated "3+2" year program in Occupational Therapy in conjunction with Columbia University's Department of Rehabilitation Medicine: three years at Stern College, followed by two years at Columbia. During their first three years, students complete general and Jewish Studies requirements, fulfill prerequisites to admission to Columbia and complete at least 22 credits towards an individually designed major (see Shaped Major).
